February is the month of love with Valentine's Day on the 14th. So as I reflect on love, it takes me to John 13:34 (NIV) where Jesus told His disciples, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Then Jesus said, "By this [loving one another] everyone will know that you are my disciples" (John 13:35). Jesus

knew that the only way to transform lives was to put love into practice in His people's lives. The best way to show people that God loves them is to show them love.

Jesus called love a new commandment. He ranked love in importance with God's other commandments, like do not steal, give false witness or kill. Jesus told His disciples that demonstrating love to others was proof of their relationship with Him. It's a new kind of love. It's a sacrificial love. It's a visible love. Jesus wanted love to be a mark of identification back then, and He still wants that for us today.

It isn't always easy to practice love. Showing love is risky. We risk rejection and make ourselves vulnerable to being hurt. It takes emotional effort and energy to practice and show love. Showing love means we take away a focus on ourselves with no guarantee for anything in return.

If you admit that your love for others needs work and we all can improve ... look to God and Jesus as the ultimate teachers of what it means to love one another. The ultimate expression of God's love was the sending of Jesus into the world. "God showed how much he loved us by sending his one and only Son into the world so that we might have eternal life through him" (1 John 4:9 NLT).

Love is the most powerful force in the world because "God is love" (1 John 4:8). And because love comes from the heart of God to us, we have the power of God to share that love with others. "Dear friends, since God loved us that much, we surely ought to love each other" (1 John 4:11 NLT).

Let me encourage you to use opportunities to be with others for occasions to grow and display your love. Let me encourage you to use opportunities to be with others to stir you to a new kind of love, a sacrificial love, a visible love. The LWML bears the mark of showing and practicing love. The LWML is an environment affirming each woman's relationship with Christ, encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in practicing love in active ministries in their congregations and beyond.

Counselor's corner

"But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world." (Gal. 6:14)

A pastor asked his catechism class once, "What does Lent mean?" After some thought, one student answered, "It means you have to give it back." The pastor, not expecting this answer, asked

for clarification, so the student explained, "If someone lent me his book, I better give it back when I'm done reading it."

With April 20 being Easter this year, almost the entire month of March is filled with the season of Lent. Our church paraments will turn to purple, our liturgies will omit songs of joy and shouts of alleluia, and our readings will begin to focus even more heavily on the suffering of Jesus Christ. For many Christians, Lent involves the giving up of something they enjoy as a show of repentance and reverence. In the church, the entire season of Lent has a very somber mood about it, a certain darkness and foreboding. Some claim that this is so that we Lutherans can be properly depressed in order to really enjoy Easter, but it's much more than that.

All throughout our Christian lives, we focus on the cross of Jesus Christ. But during Lent, our focus involves a keen understanding of why the cross is so important. Why do we leave out parts of our service,



give up things in our lives and put ashes on our foreheads? Because we are sinners, and we know it. That's what the cross is all about. When we look to the

cross, we see what we deserve for all eternity, what we should have suffered because of the sins we commit and the sinners we are. The somber mood of Lent is fitting as we acknowledge that we are by nature sinful and unclean, that we have sinned in thought, word and deed, and that we cannot free ourselves from our sinful condition. Looking to the cross, we see the pain that

our actions and inactions inflicted on our loving Lord and Savior. When we realize that, 40 days isn't nearly enough time to properly express our remorse and regret. When we consider our filthy sin, every day should be Lent, and every day should be filled with penance, mourning and sorrow.

But Lent is more than just feeling bad for what we've done. If the cross is just a reminder that you've fallen short of the glory of God, then it offers no hope, no solution, nothing but more pain. But the cross isn't just a reminder. It's a fact! The cross of Jesus Christ does indeed show us the steep price of our sin, but even more importantly, it shows us the even greater love of God for us poor, sinful beings. Willingly, Jesus Christ went to the cross to pay that price. Willingly, He suffered and died in our place. Willingly, out of a love that we will never understand, Jesus took our place beneath God's perfect and holy Law, paying a penalty that we never could.

That's why, even in the midst of this season of darkness and sorrow, we rejoice. We tell the world what Christ has done for us and for all mankind. We use our words and our deeds to point the eyes of all to the cross, and then to the empty tomb. For the cross was not the end of Jesus, nor is it the end of our faith. Jesus Christ not only died for us, but rose again from the grave, conquering sin, death and the devil for us. This is the victory that we boldly proclaim through our LWML projects, through our congregational evangelism and through our own personal witness each and every day. Amid the darkness of sin, Jesus Christ, the light of the world, brings salvation to all who believe. Redemption is a free gift from Christ, one that we don't ever have to give back.

LWML provides gift for mercy grant fund

The South Dakota District LWML, through its Special Gifts Fund, has given a gift of \$5,000 to the district president's Mercy Grant Fund. With this gift, the fund has reached its initial goal of \$40,000 and now is able to consider requests for help.

The Mercy Grant Fund was established by the district's Board of Directors in 2013. Its purpose is to assist rostered professional church workers such as pastors, teachers or directors of Christian education who may be faced with "extraordinary or catastrophic" circumstances not covered by the Synod's regular benefit packages and that involve financial hardship to the workers and their families.

Financial support for this fund comes from special gifts from individuals, congregations and groups such as the district LWML. Several congregations and individuals throughout the district have given generous gifts toward the initial \$40,000 goal. As grants are given, additional appeals will be made to provide for ongoing funding.

The \$5,000 gift from the South Dakota District LWML is over and above the ongoing mite offering projects that the LWML adopted at its last convention. In 2008, the district LWML also provided a generous gift to the South Dakota District to

help with the purchase of two passenger vans for use by our missionaries serving the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. The South Dakota

District is grateful for the Gospel partnership it shares as together we serve the Lord with gladness.


Learn how you can 'speak'

The following excerpts are from *How You Can "Speak*," a booklet available from Concordia Publishing House (item no. LFL100B). The booklet has many more ideas on how you can share the "for life" message.

"Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy" (Prov. 31:8-9 NIV).

Speaking with/through children/teens:

- Show pro-life DVDs to your junior high and high school youth groups. (Available at CPH and through our LifeFlix program.)
- As part of a Christmas program, have children bring in a new baby item (clothing, diapers, toy or formula) as a gift for Baby Jesus.



Donate these gifts to a pregnancy center or a needy family in the community.

• Give each Sunday school class an empty gallon milk jug nine months before Life Sunday and challenge the children to fill it with pennies (a full jug is supposed to weigh about as much as a large newborn). Each month, they will keep track of the "baby's" progress (size, weight, length and activity) through pictures brought in by the teacher. The children should "name" their baby. If the class fills more than one jug, they will have twins or triplets! The babies are to be "born" on Life Sunday. (This project could also be done using the *Watch Me Grow* posters and brochure.)

- Plan and hold a youth seminar on chastity.
- Hold a Life Sunday coloring contest for kids.
- Offer scholarships to students to attend the Lutherans For Life national conference.
- Hold a "Children's Day/Kid's Day Picnic" with fun, games and food — all with a "Celebration of Life" emphasis.



The deal got even better on my wife's birthday with yet another \$50 Disney gift card. All this for one low price. What a deal!

We all love a good deal. During the summer, my wife goes to garage

sales to fill our kids' wardrobes for just a few dollars. People rummage through the clearance racks and clip coupons all in search of a good deal. But of course, nothing beats free!

That's what we get with the Gospel. By God's grace, He has a deal for us that can't be beat. "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 6:23). What a deal!

But this deal still came at a great cost; it cost our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, His life. Out of His great love for us, Jesus paid for our sins, "not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death" (*Luther's Small Catechism*, The Creed–The Second Article). Jesus' death on the cross gave us the deal of a lifetime.

But about 500 years ago, Christians thought they were getting a good deal when they were being offered heaven for the price of a few small coins. This deal was known as an indulgence. Later this month, Lutheran churches will celebrate the Reformation that began when Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses to the Castle Church door in Wittenberg, Germany, on Oct. 31, 1517. Luther's little article pointed out that an indulgence was no deal at all, but that God's gift of salvation and eternal life cost us nothing — it's free!

That's too good of a deal not to share. But various circumstances prevent many people from getting this deal. Through the mites and efforts of the LWML, this free gift is being given across the country and throughout the world.

Yes, everybody loves a good deal, especially if it's free. "The free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" because of Jesus' love for us through His death on the cross. What a deal!

Special Gifts Fund

The Special Gifts Fund of the LWML South Dakota District is another tool that God uses to share the love of Jesus and help carry out the Great Commission. When special gifts come to the district, we are able to use them to support special needs that are not part of our regular budget.

The following is a list of what we were able to help fund the past two years.

- ▶ Purchased computer software for communications in our LWML South Dakota District.
- ► Sent our archivist to a training workshop in St. Louis.
- ▶ \$1,250 for South Dakota District Mites.
- ▶ \$2,500 for National Mites.
- ▶ \$3,000 to help zones send their delegate to the Pittsburgh convention (\$300 per zone).
- ▶ \$1,600 to send a second Young Woman Representative to the national convention.
- ▶ \$465 each year to provide 20 subscriptions of Today's Light, a devotion study guide, for ministry at the women's prison in Pierre.
- ▶ Up to \$750 for a memorial bench at the puppet place in memory of the Rev. Robert Utecht.
- ▶ \$5,000 for the president's Mercy Grant Fund, requested by South Dakota District President Rev. Dr. Dale Sattgast, to be used by rostered church workers in the district who are experiencing financial burden.
- ▶ \$4,500 to the Parmalee Progress Project Sewing for Christ, to purchase two sewing machines and extra supplies needed for a new sewing factory. Training began before Easter and production began in May.
- ▶ \$150 to Camp Minneboji for supplies to make witness bracelets in June 2014. The bracelets were given out at the puppet place in August 2014.
- ▶ \$7,500 to Lutheran High School of Sioux Falls toward the purchase of a van to transport students to classes and athletic and music events.
- ▶ Up to \$1,500 to send a second Young Woman Representative to the national LWML convention in 2015.
- ▶ \$600 to Sioux Falls Lutheran Preschool for outside and inside equipment.

Money for this fund comes as special gifts from estates, endowments, trusts and memorials. Financial gifts can be given to this fund by sending a check (write "Special Gifts Fund" on the memo line) and

"What do you have that you did not receive? If then vou received it, why do you boast as if you did not receive it?" (1 Cor. 4:7).

When a little boy returned from a birthday party, his mother

asked, "Did you thank Mrs. Johnson for the party?" He answered, "I was standing in the line at the front door when the boy in front of me thanked her, and she said, 'Don't mention it,' so I didn't."

Thanksgiving Day comes to Americans as a yearly opportunity to count our blessings, to recognize from whom they come and to express our thanks in prayer and song. It's an appropriate and helpful exercise because we have a tendency from day-to-day and week-toweek and month-to-month to take our enjoyment of abundance for granted, so we "don't mention it." There may be many reasons for this, but it should be obvious to all of us that we need to learn what I am calling the "grace of receiving" as described in 1 Cor. 4:7.

But shouldn't it be the "grace of giving"? Who needs to learn to receive? From childhood on, we so naturally focus on what we want and how we might get it. How often are we focused on what we think we don't have instead of on what we have already received! We don't need to be taught about receiving ... we need to learn about generous love and giving.

But there's a real principle of our life in faith here. We won't learn

about gracious, God-pleasing giving until we learn about gracious, Godpleasing receiving. The "grace of receiving" focuses on and values the giver. It doesn't focus nearsightedly on self and on the desired gift.

Maybe we should have Thanksgiving Day every week instead of only once a year, but don't we? Isn't one of the purposes of our worship on the Lord's Day to give Him thanks and praise for His blessings? It's why we recount the Good News of Jesus' life and death and rising so regularly, so we will not be thoughtless but rather learn the life-giving grace of receiving ... the life-giving grace of receiving His forgiving love and all that goes with it. If that doesn't move us to express our gratitude in word and deed, really in all of life, what will?

On Thanksgiving Day, our nation has set aside a time to "mention it" to the Giver of all. More than anything else, thank God for the Gospel. Thank God for the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation that is ours because of the sacrificial death of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. He knew that after the darkness, there would be light; after defeat, victory; after sorrow, joy; after death, resurrection.

By the resurrection of Jesus, we know that God our heavenly Father has accepted the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for our sins. And we know that we, too, will rise from the dead and be with God the Father forever and ever.

Remember to give thanks and praise to God for all of this! As you do so, you will find that the Lord has blessed you with growth in the "grace of receiving." And all of God's people said ... Amen!

I don't know about you, but that's not what Christmas morning looks like at my house. We groggily make our way downstairs in our pajamas and "bed-head" hairdos, with crusty eyes and Kleenex in hand for wiping giant boogers from the kids' noses to


